
During each session, you'll have the chance to submit your questions and get more information about the inner workings of AIIC.



A welcome cocktail/dinner will be organised on Friday evening, stay tuned for further details.


GET READY FOR LISBON

With the conference season starting to wind down in July, heading to PRIMS in Lisbon is the perfect excuse for some last-minute CPD as well as a cheeky teaser to the summer holidays.

Getting to Lisbon has never been easier – Lisbon airport boasts direct flights to and from 137 destinations (including AIIC Regions such as USA, Brazil, MCAC, Canada, Africa, Turkey, Arab Countries, Israel). You can also fly into – or out of – Porto or Faro and travel to Lisbon via <u>train</u> or <u>bus</u>.

After the intense networking and exchanges at PRIMS, exploring Lisbon, travelling around Portugal or to nearby locations such as Marrakech, Madeira, or the Azores before you return home is just what you need. If you're adding Portuguese as a working language, why not take a month-long, <u>intense language course</u> at the Faculty of Letters in Lisbon? With Portuguese being one of the most widely spoken languages in the world, there are also plenty of other languagelearning schools and institutes in town to choose from.



Culture abounds in Portugal! Step into the riverfront <u>MAAT</u> for art, architecture or technology; head to the <u>Mosteiro dos Jerónimos</u>, one of seventeen Portuguese UNESCO World Heritage Sites; lose yourself in the colours and patterns of the Museu Nacional do Azulejo in downtown Alfama, one of Lisbon's most characteristic neighbourhoods; pay homage to the country's past and visit the <u>Museu do Aljube Resistência</u> e Liberdade and the 2024 special exhibition in occasion of the 50th anniversary of the Carnation Revolution.

For foodies, Portugal's capital has a lot of offer. Try classic sweets, such as *pastel de nata*, and explore savoury dishes linked to the country's past, like *bacalhau* that has been around since Viking times.

Along with traditional dishes, you'll find plenty of fusion and international fare, especially from countries with old ties to Portugal.



To escape the buzz of Lisbon, popular day trips include <u>Sintra and Pena Palace</u> as well as Cascais, just under an hour away by train, or the westernmost point of continental Europe, <u>Cabo da Roca</u>. Took a look <u>here</u> for more ideas that include sandy beaches and cooling waters, perfect for the summer months.

If you're more of a walker or cyclist, the <u>Rota Vicentina</u>, wending along Portugal's central and southern coast, awaits. Or you can take a stab at the <u>Caminho Português</u> from Oporto to Valença. Just don't forget to rest and hydrate, hydrate, hydrate! And speaking of water – if there are any budding surfers among you, then there are plenty of spots both in Lisbon and up north and down south where you can test your balancing skills and ride the waves of the Atlantic.

Bop and ride to a different kind of wave in July, as this is the month of music festivals in Portugal. Some highlights are the <u>NOS Alive</u> (Lisbon, 11-13 July), the <u>Festival Super Bock</u> <u>Super Rock</u> (Sesimbra, 18-20 July), and the <u>MEO Marés Vivas</u> (Vila Nova de Gaia 19-21 July). If you prefer your music and entertainment to be a bit more 'dated', why not visit Obido's famous <u>Medieval Fair</u>, taking place between 18-28 July, or plan a road trip to visit some of the twelve <u>Historical Villages of Portugal</u>.

The Portuguese Region is looking forward to welcoming you to Lisbon!

Members coming to the events in Rome will have the opportunity to pre-order AIIC t-shirts and hoodies online and pick them up in Rome.


Unfortunately, we can't mail them to you at this time, but if the initiative proves popular, there may be another chance in Lima.

BRAZIL




AIIC Brazil is teaming up with the national interpreters' association, APIC, for a series on Sign Language interpreting. Registration details will be available soon.

SPAIN



Course on Plain Language Interpreting Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona, 31 January, 1 and 2 February 2024 Organised by ESPaiic with the participation of Plena Inclusión

The first Plain Language Interpreting Course in Europe organised by ESPaiic with the participation of Plena Inclusión is an excellent example of cognitive accessibility, which can benefit many groups in society.

The Course on Plain Language Interpreting in Spanish, held at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona on 31 January, 1 and 2 February 2024, was organised by ESPaiic (Spain Region) and run by course designer and AIIC member Myriam Nahón (Israel Region).

This was the first training course of its kind in Europe for professional interpreters. Interpreting into plain language is an even more complex task than interpreting from one language into another, as it requires greater processing of the information. It is, therefore, essential to receive training before being able to provide this service. Given the great interest in this event, additional courses will be organised in the near future both in Spain and in other countries.

In Barcelona, it was a privilege to be able to learn first-hand about the needs of people with intellectual disabilities through the participation of Plena Inclusión represented by Romà Javierre, from Dincat - Plena Inclusión Catalunya, and Xavi Orno, member of the Observatori de Drets de Dincat (Dincat's Rights Observatory).

Plain language interpreting is a form of conference interpreting and an excellent example of cognitive accessibility. It provides access to information for people with intellectual disabilities and contributes to their inclusion in society. Plain language interpreting is an enabler for people with intellectual disabilities to interact with their environment by accessing information presented in conferences, debates and news programmes, and to participate on equal terms in interviews, dialogues and meetings.

We are confident that this form of cognitive accessibility will become one of the primary tools to make the right to access information a reality not only for people with intellectual disabilities but also for many other groups who will benefit from more comprehensible information, such as the elderly, children and young people, and immigrants who do not speak the language.

AFRICA

Highlights of the AIIC Africa Regional Meeting, 16 March 2024 Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire

11 February 2024 and 16 March 2024 will go down in the history of Abidjan for years to come. Whilst the former saw the crowning of the African football champions, the latter saw the gathering of illustrious AIIC Africa and Arab Countries Regions' members - young, not so old and old. And all agreed on one thing: despite all the changes that virtual meetings heralded, nothing could replace the value of face-to-face interaction.



Indeed, looking at the sheer number of members present, not to mention those connected virtually, it was a timely meeting to discuss important issues affecting us, especially in the post-pandemic world. It was no surprise to see the attention given to the various reports by the Bureau, the ExCo representative, professional delegations, trainers and other office-bearers. As we all know, listening is inherent to our job, but talking is also part of our DNA. It's therefore in true fashion that we heartily discussed RSI, the restructuring of AIIC's technical bodies, the non-remuneration of volunteers, etc.

The afternoon outreach session on joining AIIC and giving back to AIIC, open to nonmembers too, was marked by a great sense of camaraderie. It started off with an Intergenerational Dialogue moderated by Sylvia Amisi with a panel comprising Francis Eke-Metoho, Caroll Moudachirou, Caroline Imboua-Niava and Emmanuel Petros. Panelists spoke about the benefits of AIIC membership including career development, credibility and access to resources; preparing oneself for the evolving landscape of the profession with AI technologies as well as maintaining work-life balance, upholding ethics and leveraging AIIC's networks. Marjolaine Escande-Wadike's intervention on AIIC sponsors' obligations was a good wrap-up of the panel discussion. The convo between Malick Sy, Honorary President, and Emmanuel Ayuk on volunteering was just as riveting. Drawing from his rich experience, Malick demonstrated that volunteering is a combination of selflessness, sacrifice and service.

As we reminisce on this AIIC Africa Regional Meeting and the delicious cake we shared to belatedly celebrate AIIC's 70th birthday, we say "hats off" to the organising committee! This was not just a "coup de maître", it was also a "coup du marteau^{*}"!


