A new report from the language industry research team at **Nimdzi Insights**, <u>Interpreting Across the Globe: No One Size</u>

<u>Fits All</u>, offers a comparative overview of the interpreting market in twelve countries. While the study is by no means



comprehensive – it misses out some of the most important AIIC regions altogether – and covers all forms of interpreting, not just conference interpreting, it does give some interesting (and perhaps controversial) insights into current market trends and differences between markets.

Polish courts confirm interpreter's confidentiality


In September AIIC's Executive Committee released a statement applauding the **decision of the Polish courts** that a high-level interpreter should not be called to testify. Ms Magda Fitas
Dukaczewska had refused demands from the Polish National Prosecution Authority that she
testify regarding discussions she had interpreted between the Polish and Russian Prime

Ministers, invoking the principle of professional confidentiality.

Secretariat's corner

AllC Directory: The hard copy edition of the 2020 Directory is being finalized. It will be printed in December and mailed in mid-January to those members who have chosen to opt in for hard copies. The <u>rules concerning the information printed in upcoming Directories</u> have also been updated (login required).



Registered e-mail addresses: We need each member and pre-candidate to provide an e-mail address that can be used to receive AIIC communications and for access to the AIIC members website. Currently there are close to 40 people who have not yet registered an e-mail address and who cannot be reached by the Secretariat using the most recent contact details provided. The Secretariat will contact the affected Regional Offices within the next two weeks to discuss how these members and pre-candidates could be contacted.

Pre-candidate application fees: We remind pre-candidates that they are required to pay the application fees invoiced on registration, as well as any annual administrative fees. Automated reminders have been set up in coordination with the Budget Commission and the Regional Treasurers, and are in operation since the beginning of 2019. However, despite these reminders, some pre-candidates have still not settled their arrears. The Secretariat will provide a list of these pre-candidates to CACL for consideration at their next meeting in January 2020.

We are currently finishing the bibliography and will make it available to members on a dedicated page of the members website, to be announced in the next Digest. We are sure this information will be useful to any members or groups carrying out research.
